1. What is C2A3?

C2A3 is the *Community College Alliance for Agriculture Advancement*, a national network of community colleges committed to advancing agricultural education, applied research, and workforce development—especially in partnership with the USDA-NRCS.

2. Who can become a member of C2A3?

Community colleges with agriculture and/or natural resources programs—or those looking to develop such programs—are eligible.

3. What are the benefits of joining C2A3?

Members gain access to:

- USDA-NRCS partnerships & funding opportunities
- Applied research collaboration
- Curriculum development support
- Professional development & networking
- National student leadership programs & internships
- Conferences, workshops, and resource sharing
- Advocacy opportunities at state and federal levels

4. What is required of member colleges?

Colleges are expected to:

- Engage faculty and students in Alliance activities
- Collaborate with local NRCS offices
- Attend conferences and share findings/resources
- Help grow regional and national membership
- Participate in applied research and outreach is highly encouraged, but not required

5. How is C2A3 funded?

C2A3 is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization supported through a combination of public and private funding sources. Current and prospective funding includes cooperative agreements with USDA-NRCS, support from USDA Rural Development and SARE, grants from the NSF-ATE program, membership dues from partner institutions, and strategic partnerships with businesses and industry leaders.

6. Are there student opportunities through C2A3?

Yes! C2A3 offers a variety of valuable opportunities for students, many of which include travel support or stipends. Students may apply and potentially receive funding to:

- Intern with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)
- Participate in the ASPIRE Student Leadership Program
- Travel to Washington, D.C. for the USDA Agricultural Outlook Forum
- Present research or projects at national conferences
- Engage in mentorship and take part in local leadership initiatives

7. What is the ASPIRE Program?

ASPIRE (Accelerating Student Participation in the Rural Economy) is a 6-month student leadership program that includes:

- Leadership training conference
- Webinars on community development
- Mentorship from local leaders
- A hands-on project in their community
- A trip to Washington, D.C.

8. How does C2A3 support faculty and staff?

- Professional development workshops and conferences
- Webinars and peer collaboration
- Curriculum and lab resource sharing
- Opportunities to lead or co-lead research projects
